

RPMC 2024 Call to Caucus

Please take notice that there is hereby called, by action of the Chairman of the Republican Party of Milwaukee County, a County Caucus as provided in Article IX, Section 9.01 of the Constitution of the Republican Party of Milwaukee County for the purpose of transacting the following business:

1. To elect Representatives to serve on the following Committees:

Credentials, Resolutions, and Rules for the 1st, 4th, and 5th Congressional Districts.

- 2. Acceptance of Delegates/Alternates to district caucuses and the Republican Party of Wisconsin State Convention.
 - 3. To promulgate and adopt the reports from the committees on Credentials, Rules, and Resolutions.
 - 4. To hear reports from Milwaukee County party leaders, elected officials, and other invited guests.
 - 5. To transact any other business that may become necessary to gain the objectives of the RPMC.

Membership renewals must be made no later than Thursday, February 8th, 2024 (nine days before the caucus) to be eligible to vote at the county caucus. New members must have joined no later than Friday, January 19th, 2024 (29 days before the caucus) to be eligible to vote at the county caucus.


Meanwhile, the state's doctors say there hasn't been enough research on its efficacy.

Why Conservatives Embrace Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Timeless Message [WRN VOICES]






January 28, 1986 - Remembering the Challenger: The U.S.
Space Shuttle <u>Challenger exploded</u> 74 seconds into its flight, killing seven persons, including Christa McAuliffe, a teacher who was to be the first ordinary citizen in space.



January 23, 1907 - Charles Curtis of Kansas became the first person of Native American ancestry to serve in the U.S Senate. He later served as vice president under President Herbert Hoover from 1929-33.

Madison – State Representative Janel Brandtjen released the following statement on the initial resolution (AR 18) to impeach Meagan Wolfe:

"AR 18 is not a bill; it's a non-binding resolution and is the first step in impeaching Meagan Wolfe. It has faced additional hurdles as Speaker Vos and Representative Steffen have created obstacles by pretending that the resolution requires a committee hearing or committee vote. Resolutions can go directly to the floor for passage but are only sent to committees when leadership wants them to die. Once again, Robin Vos is doing everything he can to protect Meagan Wolfe. It's a shame that the misinformation continues instead of addressing the chief election officer in Wisconsin, who has repeatedly broken the law without consequences.
